PRESENTATIONS TO BRAVE PADSTOW LADS.

On Monday evening last in the Church Room, Padstow, the Rev. W. Craig-Thompson publicly presented Alexander Hornabrook and Joshua Langford, youths of this town, with vellum certificates from the Royal Humane Society. In making the presentation, the vicar testified to the pleasure it gave him to hand these certificates to two lads who were members of the Church Lads Brigade, and the Royal Humane Society wished to make such presentations as public as Hornibrook had saved two lives from drowning previous to the last at Padstow on the 2nd May this year, but the society only recognised such brave deeds when notified within three months. Langford saved a boy from drowning at the Fish Quay, Plymouth, on the 13th April last. The vicar said such deeds should act as a stimulus to others to go and do likewise, and when necessary endanger their lives to save others. Hornabrook thanked the vicar for his kindness, and expressed his willingness to render similar service when necessary. Mr. R. S. Langford, vicar's warden, said he once saved a boy some years ago, and spoke of the heroism displayed on the high seas by a Padstow captain, Harry Brenton, and Albert Moore. The Rev. W. Craig-Thompson thanked the audience for their attendance, and the meeting dispersed after cheers had been raised for the two boys. PADSTOW WESLEYANS.
